NEWS FROM THE CEMETERY

"Perpetual Care" At one time, lot owners could purchase, for an additional fee, a service called "perpetual care." This assured them that their lot would be mowed and otherwise maintained forever. For many years now, this service has been provided for the entire cemetery, and is included in the purchase price of the lot. (Practically speaking, it is easier to mow the entire cemetery than it is to mow just certain lots.)

Repair and straightening of stones is not included in "perpetual care," and is the responsibility of the family. However, for the past several years we have been fortunate to obtain the services of the men from Camp Pharsalia for a couple of weeks during the season, and they have helped us to maintain the stones, improving the overall appearance of the cemetery. We appreciate their help.

Foundations A few years ago, we decided to try a different type of foundation for the stones that are placed in the cemetery. Instead of the deep, heavy concrete foundations, which are very difficult to straighten if they become crooked, we began using a 2-inch stone slab placed over a bed of fine stone. Other cemeteries had used this type of foundation and reported that it was better, and our experience has confirmed this. We hope everyone appreciates the improvement.

Columbarium We now have a columbarium in the cemetery. It is a granite structure with compartments to hold the ashes of the deceased. Ours has 48 compartments, and offers an alternative to burial of the remains of those who have been cremated. The door of each compartment will have engraved on it the name and dates of the deceased, and will be permanently sealed. Further details can be obtained at the cemetery office. The columbarium is located above section 5 on the north side of the cemetery.

<u>Photographs</u> Several stones have attached to them ceramic photographs of the deceased. This is a matter of personal preference, and is permitted, although the ceramic is not indestructible. The cemetery office is now able to provide stainless steel photographs for attachment, which seem to be more permanent. Examples are available for inspection.

Rules There are rules posted in the cemetery, although they do not cover everything. In order to keep the cemetery beautiful with a small crew, modern power machinery is used. It is not always possible to avoid contact with decorations by a mower or weed-eater, and we should keep that in mind when choosing the materials that are placed there. Artificial flowers are permitted only between November and April. Thanks for your cooperation.

This year, the cemetery was kept in beautiful condition by our crew: Ron Meek (superintendent), Tom Whittaker, Travis Frank, and Rene Fahey. Thanks, men!
